Although the meeting was not unopposed to determine what will be done with the site after demolition of the building, there was some discussion of the matter and a few questions concerning the above provisions.

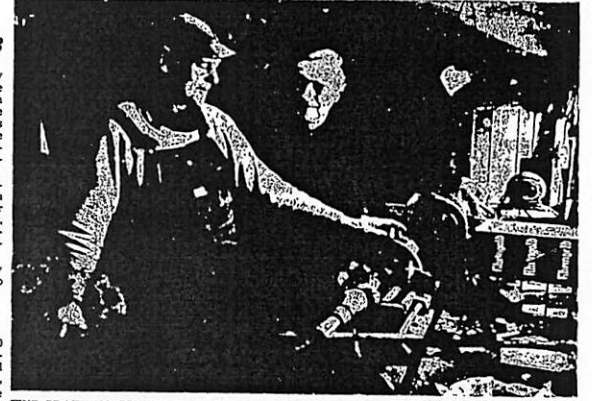
CAREFUL WITH THAT SNOW JOB

Town Clerks Face New Regulations

The Town Clerks offices throughout the state of Connecticut underwent many new innovations as of January 1, due to laws passed by the 1967 session of the Connecticut General Assembly.

Daily Voter Registration For the first time in the history of the State of Connecticut, a prospective elector, meeting all the qualifications for being made a voter, will be able to appear at the town clerk's office during regular office hours and make application to be made a voter.

Each town will still be required to have its regular monthly voter-making session; however, the next procedure will give a prospective elector the opportunity to make application at his convenience at his local town clerk's office during the regular office hours.

Covered Bridge Repairs Started

The State Highway Department has announced that the West Cornwall Covered Bridge on Rt. 128 is closed to vehicular traffic during work hours for about one month starting yesterday, January 3.

The purpose of the closing is to replace the bridge deck, according to Department engineers.

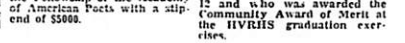
