SALISBURY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

REGULAR MEETING

FEBRUARY 21, 2024 – 6:00PM (HYBRID)

Present: Kitty Kiefer, Robert Schaufelberger, Tom Shachtman and Ward Belcher. Absent: Carol Sadlon

- 1. **Approval of Agenda. So Moved** by T. Shachtman, seconded by R. Schaufelberger and unanimously **Approved**.
- **2. Approval of Minutes of January 17, 2024. So Moved** by R. Schaufelberger, seconded by T. Shachtman and unanimously **Approved.**
- 3. New Business K. Kiefer had maps to add to the Marketplace of Salisbury file, regarding food trucks; W. Belcher mentioned that he had sent a letter to Don Mayland, but did not get a response about food truck authorizations. K. Kiefer mentioned that a recent food truck did have a Torrington Area Health certificate. Curtis Rand was contacted about the matter; K. Kiefer suggested it may go on the Board of Selectmen agenda. R. Schaufelberger pointed out that Canaan has an ordinance and charges a fee for food trucks; that has been considered in other towns. K. Kiefer will check about an ordinance in Salisbury.
- 4. Old Business: Committee member projects and updates.
 - a. Letter of support for Pathways DEEP grant application (Letter attached). T. Shachtman indicated the letter should be approved by the SEDC; K. Kiefer, Chair, will sign the letter for the SEDC. A Motion to Approve the Letter of Support for the Pathways grant application was made by R. Schaufelberger, seconded by W. Belcher and unanimously Approved.
 - b. EV Charging possibilities Update R. Schaufelberger reported that the PZC has adopted new language for EV Chargers that should clear the way for the SEDC project. He noted that he has taken 2 online training courses for managing the EV charging stations; he will be volunteering to help the town set up the planned EV charging station, when in place. The new P&Z regulation became effective 2/15/2024. R. Schaufelberger pointed out that the EVs will be universal for all to use and substantial features are available.
 - c. Toulman Trust and NHCOG Updates --W. Belcher reported that he will be in touch with Dan Jerram, NHGOG soon. Regarding the Toulman Trust (a trust for the Grove), he is planning to meet with Joe Cleaveland and then pursue it with the Grove Advisory Board; this will be continued at another meeting. K. Kiefer suggested staying on top of the funds and the need to find out what the donor wanted done with that money.
 - d. Transfer station, recyclables, compost and the future T. Shachtman commented on an article in the Lakeville Journal today; getting rid of garbage is a big problem and will be worse by 2027. The NHCOG is trying to do something now. To try to minimize the impact

locally, ideas include trying to make money from recycling; doing more composting; separating out glass from the single stream; eliminating cardboard. T. Shachtman met with John Brett (Selectman in Sharon), to talk about recycling, including the idea of bulk-buying recyclables containers for each homeowner; the containers could then be sold for a one-time fee of \$100. In general, recycling costs need to be addressed, including the mill rate, going forward. This is a project for the SEDC to work on; there is also the Transfer Station Recycling Advisory Committee. W. Belcher suggested going back to separating recyclables.

- e. Communications with Frontier and Maria Horn K. Kiefer reported that she is about to have meetings with Frontier and Maria Horn; she has also met with a group of local women who have no internet service at all. Questions to Maria Horn will include: calls to the Resident Trooper and the Barracks about problems in the villages; speed enforcement cameras to write speeding tickets; the Appalachian Trail. R. Schaufelberger expressed frustration with Frontier; it's a year later and nothing has happened. W. Belcher pointed out that Comcast is putting its rates up. He also asked about the new cell tower in Lakeville; K. Kiefer will investigate that with Curtis Rand. There was a general discussion about internet service.
- f. Building Community Insights C. Sadlon sent a brief report to the members; T. Shachtman would like to have more information on some of those good ideas. There was further general discussion about ways to encourage more foot traffic with vendor opportunities in town.

The Salisbury Economic Development Committee endorses and recommends the Salisbury Pathways Committee's proposal for a safe, environmentally friendly pedestrian access from the Appalachian Trail across open land to the village of Salisbury.
