1 <u>"Allowed" Activities Not Requiring a Permit</u>

- 2 It is the public policy of the State of Connecticut to require municipal regulation of
- 3 activities affecting inland wetlands and watercourses. The Salisbury Inland Wetlands and
- 4 Watercourses Commission (IWWC) is the local agency tasked with this responsibility. It is
- 5 through a combination of regulation by the Town and good stewardship of wetland
- 6 resources and the associated Upland Review Areas (URA) on behalf of landowners, that we
- 7 will be able to protect our environment and ecology "in order to forever guarantee to the
- 8 people of the state, the safety of such natural resources for their benefit and enjoyment
- 9 and for the benefit and enjoyment of generations yet unborn."
- 10 The Inland Wetlands and Watercourses Act designates the specific power to hear, consider
- 11 and decide upon applications for regulated activities involving inland wetlands and
- 12 watercourses (including activities in the URA) and to determine whether proposed
- activities are exempt from, or otherwise not subject to regulation.
- 14 To that end, the IWWC has developed a list of routine activities that are permissible within
- 15 <u>the URA and do not require prior approval by the IWWC</u>. However, if the scope of work in
- 16 the URA exceeds the items listed below, it will require a review by the IWWC or its agent to
- 17 ensure that wetland resources are properly protected. If you have any uncertainties, kindly

- 20 Protecting the precious wetlands is a joint responsibility of all within our community. We
- 21 thank you for your cooperation.
- 22 On an established residential property, the following routine activities occurring in the
- 23 Upland Review Area (not a wetland or watercourse) do not require application to the
- 24 Inland Wetlands and Watercourses or its Agent.
 - a. Mowing an existing lawn. Note: Wetland buffers, regardless of their precise size, provide a multitude of valuable functions that contribute to the overall health and functionality of wetland ecosystems. Even small un-mowed buffers offer valuable protection for wetlands, and increasing the size of a buffer will increase the level of protection.
 - b. Weeding, planting, fertilizing, or mulching of already existing gardens. Note: Use of fertilizers within the URA should be minimized as it contributes to nutrient loading within wetland ecosystems.
 - c. Care and maintenance of existing shrubs and trees including pruning or removal of dead limbs or targeted application of pesticides. Pesticides shall be used in accordance with specifications in the corresponding product label. Use of pesticides in the URA should be minimized. Use of pesticides in a wetland

39 requires a permit by IWWC. Use of pesticides in the waterbody requires a permit by 40 DEEP Pesticides Division. Use of pesticides in the waterbody requires a permit by 41 the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection Pesticides 42 Division. 43 44 d. Hand removal or Spot Treatment of invasive (ex; Japanese barberry) or nuisance 45 plants (ex. poison ivy). Herbicides shall be used in accordance with 46 specifications in the corresponding product label. Generally, the IWWC is in 47 support of invasive management. Use of herbicides in the URA should be 48 minimized. Use of herbicides in a wetland requires a permit by IWWC. Use of 49 herbicides in the waterbody requires a permit by DEEP Pesticides Division. 50 51 e. Yard cleaning, including clearing away fallen leaves and branches in an existing 52 lawn or landscaped area so long as yard debris, leaves, or mulch are not blown 53 or deposited on a wetland or watercourse. 54 55 f. Removal of only dead, dying, or fallen trees that threaten structures or access 56 ways. If more than 5 trees are involved consult with the Land Use Office. Stump 57 grinding or grubbing within 20 ft of the edge of wetland requires review by IWWC. 58 g. Planting of a flower, herb or vegetable garden, native (or native cultivar) shrubs 59 and trees that are less than 500 sq ft disturbance. A disturbance greater than 500 60 61 sq ft requires a permit by the IWWC or its agent. 62 63 h. Maintenance and repair of existing structures including cleaning, painting, 64 roofing, and septic pump-out. 65 i. Storage of water-dependent structures and equipment including docks and 66 67 boats. 68 69 Activities which require earth moving or disturbance such as driveway and septic
